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## Online Registration: Thursday, May 18 – Tuesday, May 23 \*

Please read through this packet *before* you attempt to register online. You should [check now](#) to see if you have any holds that will prevent you from registering.

Find **your registration start date** in the message for Learning Content: **Registration Appointment & Instructions** in your [online application](#). Florence registration appointments are not viewable in MySlice (SU Students: note that any appointment reflected in MySlice is for main campus registration only). All students' registration appointments expire at 3:00 PM EDT on Tuesday, May 23. After this date, an SU Abroad Registration Hold will prevent you from making any changes to your schedule until you arrive in Florence.

### ALL STUDENTS, PLEASE NOTE:

There is a scheduled MySlice outage on Saturday, May 20 from 5:00 AM to 6:00 PM EDT. Please plan accordingly.

## Featured Courses

- [CRS/HST/REL/WGS 451](#) – Visual Culture Past and Present: Gender, Religion and Politics  
With visits to Florence museums and the Palazzo Pitti, you will look at paintings, prints, and decorated furniture to evaluate how art media then and now contributes to the visual literacy of the viewing public and to the construction of gender relations and social roles, religious precepts, and political identity.
- [EDU 400.1](#) – The Industry of Knowledge: Higher Education in a Global Context  
Taught by the director of the Syracuse Florence program, this class encourages you to critically reflect on your own experience studying abroad, what it means to globalize teaching and learning, and how other European countries approach education. You get to see behind the scenes of study abroad and visit various programs throughout Florence, which has become a vibrant hub of international education.
- [PTG 300.1](#) – New Approaches to Renaissance Painting Techniques and Conservation through Modern Technology  
Learn traditional Renaissance techniques of painting and how modern technology is used to restore and preserve them. Your instructors are expert restorers with decades of experience restoring works by the great masters in Florence—a renowned center of innovation in fine art restoration. Use what you learn to paint with egg tempera on wood and make a true fresco in our art studio. During online registration, this course is open only to students admitted to the Studio Arts program. Others may request to add this course in Florence on a space-available basis.

## Course Announcements

### Cancellation

We will not offer **HOA 424** – Sixteenth Century Italian Art and Identity in Fall 2017.

### Italian Courses

Study of Italian is an SU Florence requirement. While you **will** now register online for your self-selected ITA course, note that **your selection is subject to review and confirmation in Florence during orientation week**. You will register for a placeholder section by selecting both your level and preferred time slot (when more than one section is offered). Consult the [Italian Language section](#) of the [Time Schedule](#) for this information.

- **Most students** (everyone at the beginning or intermediate levels) will be in ITA classes Mondays through Thursdays – same time slot each day).
- **Syracuse students with no Italian credit on their SU transcript** (including beginners, native or heritage speakers, and those who studied the language in high school) must take the Italian online placement exam (accessed through [MySlice](#)) prior to registering. Please contact Jeanne Chu at [jechu100@syr.edu](mailto:jechu100@syr.edu) if you need to request access. This test will identify your language level to confirm that you have registered for the appropriate course. [Instructions on accessing this exam](#) are

available online. [Please note that while the instructions use the Spanish placement exam as an example, the steps are the same for all language exams.]

- **Visiting students**, if you are unsure of your language level, review the ITA course descriptions and consult with an advisor in the languages department of your home school. You may also request access to SU's online placement exam by contacting Jeanne Chu at [jechu100@syr.edu](mailto:jechu100@syr.edu).

## **SU Students: READ ME!** **Registration Notes Specifically for You**

The online registration system for SU Abroad classes does NOT operate the same as for Main Campus classes. You will need to READ THESE INSTRUCTIONS! Here are some key differences:

- You cannot use "Class Search" or "My Planner" for Florence classes since they do not appear in the MySlice database. In order to register, be sure you are on the **Enroll tab** and use the 5-digit class numbers highlighted on the [Time Schedule of Classes](#).
- DO NOT use the online Help during registration (some of these directions do not apply to Florence class registration). Instead, refer to the enclosed [three-column chart](#) that details how to add, drop, and swap classes, and the [Online Enrollment Guide](#).
- You cannot register for more than 16 semester credits during the online registration period (MySlice will prevent you from doing so). If you would like to take more than 16 credits, you may add a course in Florence, on a space-available basis, during the first week of classes.
- In some cases, the system may not prevent you from registering for classes for which you are not eligible. Be sure to note any prerequisites indicated in the [Time Schedule](#) and [course descriptions](#), and select only classes for which you are eligible. Please note that you may be dropped from any class for which you are deemed ineligible based on the transcript information available to us.

## **Courses Not Open for Online Registration**

### **University of Florence (UniFI) Courses Taught in English** (applies **only** to students accepted to this special program)

Students accepted to this special program will register for UniFI courses during orientation in Florence. This is because the time schedule for these classes will not be available until just before the semester begins. During online registration, be sure to register for your SU Florence Center courses!

### **Studio Arts Classes** (applies **only** to students **NOT** accepted to the Studio Arts Program)

Students who did not apply or were not accepted to the Studio Arts (SA) program may request to take **one** studio arts class in Florence by attending the Studio Arts meeting during orientation week. Only Studio Arts Program students will register online for these courses.



## Registration Restrictions

### Art History Courses

- During online registration, students may register for only **one** of these art history courses:
    - HOA 203 – [Italian Arts from Antiquity to Michelangelo](#)
    - HOA 320 – [Italian Renaissance Art](#)
- **Students who disregard this directive will be administratively dropped from the additional restricted course. (The registration system will not prevent you from registering for more than one of these courses.)** If seats remain open after all students have registered, you may request to add the other HOA course after you arrive in Florence.

### Credit Limit

During online registration, **MySlice will not allow students to register for more than 16 credits** (4-5 semester courses). Students who need to register for more than this typical course load should contact our office via email to [Jeanne Chu](#) prior to the registration period to explain their academic need. Students who would like (but don't need) to take more than 16 credits may add a course in Florence, on a space-available basis, during the first week of classes.

- **This credit restriction will not impact students participating in the Greek Odyssey Signature Seminar; our office will administratively register participants for this course after online registration concludes.**

### Special Enrollment Courses

Refer to the enclosed list of [Special Enrollment Courses](#) to see if you may register for either of the courses noted on the [Time Schedule](#) as **SPEC ENROLL**.

### Prerequisites

Other courses are restricted to students who have had prior course experience. **Be sure you have met any prerequisites for a course you plan to take.** Prerequisites are indicated on the Time Schedule (Restrictions/Requisites/Notes column), with equivalent courses described for visiting students in each [course description](#). If you do not meet the prerequisite, the system may not allow you to enroll. If you are blocked from a course during online registration and you believe you have the necessary background, contact [Jeanne Chu](#) with supporting information demonstrating that you are eligible for this course.

## Courses in High Demand

Based on information from submitted Student Advising Forms, some courses may reach capacity and close during registration. **Be sure to have some alternative classes identified (and even placed in your Shopping Cart in MySlice)**, in case a class you would like to take is closed when you register. ## Registration Notes

### University Cross-listed Courses

A number of courses have cross-listings (they can be registered under more than one prefix and/or number, such as CLA/LIT/REL 421). To prevent you from getting closed out of such a course under one prefix while seats under the other listings are still open, we have provided only a single class number for each cross-listed course. This means that you may want to take Classical Mythology for Literature (LIT) credits or for Religion (REL) credits but will see it on your schedule in MySlice as CLA 421. Don't be concerned. Once you get to Florence, you will have an opportunity to correct your registration so that it reflects the course prefix you want.

### Screenings

FIL 300.1/LIT 423 offers two choices for the required screening. While you do **not** select your preferred screening when you register online (sign-up takes place in Florence), you do need to ensure that you can fit at least one of the screenings into your schedule.

### Wait Lists

If you are on a wait list for a course, this will be addressed in Florence during schedule adjustment. Wait-listed students are required to attend the first class session and speak with the instructor to demonstrate continued interest in the course. **Make sure you are registered for at least 12 credits *not counting any wait-listed courses*.** This is necessary in order to fulfill both Italian immigration and SU Florence program requirements.

## Schedule Adjustment

You will receive a copy of your schedule in Florence, which you will then be asked to confirm. During the first week of classes, you will have an opportunity to make changes to your registration—drop and add classes—with instructor permission. **You will not schedule-adjust online** (an SU Abroad Registration Hold prevents you from making changes to your registration once the Florence online registration period ends). You will receive instructions on the schedule adjustment process in Florence.

## Study Tours and Course Fees

Some courses include required study tours, site visits, or activities that are an integral part of the course. As you select your courses and build your schedule, please carefully review the [Course-Related Fees sheet](#). Also share it with your parents/guardians if they are financially responsible for your fees. Fees to cover the costs of supplies and mandatory field study are charged automatically to your Bursar account when you register.

If you register for any course with a mandatory study tour, you must participate in this field study. **Do not plan personal travel until you arrive in Florence and know when you may be required to take part in a class-related study tour, make-up classes, Signature Seminar sessions, exam periods, and other academic commitments.**

## Checklist: How To Prepare To Register for Classes

### What to do BEFORE your registration appointment:

- Be sure you know your NetID and Password so you can access [MySlice](#) for course registration. If you have not used MySlice before, or if you have not activated your account or have forgotten your password, you can set up a new account or reset your password at the [IT Services website](#). **You'll need your SUID number to activate your NetID.** (Visiting Students: You can find your SUID number on your SU Abroad application home page.) If you have activated your account but forgotten your Net ID, consult [the NetID self-service site](#).
- Check to see if you need to verify and/or update contact information on MySlice. You may also have to acknowledge that you have read the 'Know the Codes' document. Log into MySlice, select any of the links in Student Services and you will automatically be forwarded to any items that must be reviewed/updated.
- Check for holds that will prevent you from registering (see "[How to View Holds](#)").
- Confirm your schedule using the following materials:
  - ✓ The **Student Advising Form** you uploaded to your online application
  - ✓ [Time Schedule of Classes](#)
    - Remember to save a time slot for your required ITA class.
    - Check prerequisites in course descriptions and on the Time Schedule. Do not select any course for which you are not eligible. SU Abroad reserves the right to drop you from any course for which you are deemed ineligible based on the transcript information available to us.
    - Record the Class Numbers (**yellow-highlighted** 5-digit number found in the first column of the Time Schedule). **You will enter these numbers when you register to select your classes.**
    - Do not select courses whose meeting times conflict.
  - ✓ [Special Enrollment Lists](#) – ONLY STUDENTS ON THE LISTS WILL BE ABLE TO REGISTER FOR THESE COURSES!
- Before your registration appointment, add your course selections to your Shopping Cart in MySlice** (refer to the [Online Enrollment Guide](#)). While you will only initially register for 4–5 semester courses (12 to 16 credits), you can also put some alternative selections in your cart. Once you have access to register, log back into MySlice and click the boxes next to your first-choice courses and 'ENROLL' to register for classes. If you are unable to get into one or more classes, your alternative courses will still be in your cart for selection.
- If you are a **Syracuse student** and have not taken any ITA courses at SU nor brought in Italian language transfer or other credit, take the [online Italian placement exam](#). **COURSE-RELATED FEES  
FLORENCE FALL 2017**

**REVIEW AND GIVE TO YOUR PARENT/GUARDIAN**

Students who register for any of the courses listed below will be charged a fee to cover special activities, such as field study or attendance at special events, which are an integral part of the course. Field study fees may reflect cost of transportation, accommodations, guest lectures, and most entry fees. Attendance is mandatory, so we strongly discourage students from booking any personal travel before finalizing their registration in Florence so they know which course-related field study they will be required to attend.

Fees are billed from Syracuse University following the overseas registration period and will appear on a subsequent Bursar statement. Students receive an email notice to view their bill in MySlice. **These fees are not included** in either the tuition or program fees, which are billed prior to departure. Any new course-related fees or fee increases approved after this date will be announced prior to registration. All students who register for a course with a course-related fee are required to pay the fee, even if they are only auditing the course.

Please note: All field study is planned in advance and subject to change due to unforeseen circumstances (safety or weather-related alerts, strikes, etc.). In the event there are any changes to the proposed schedule/itinerary, we will either provide an alternative option of comparable academic significance and cost, or process the applicable credit to students' Bursar accounts.

**Financial Deadline to Withdraw from the Program:** Please refer to the [SU Tuition, Fees, and Related Policies Bulletin](#) for information on refund of course-related fees for students who withdraw from the program voluntarily, involuntarily, or due to suspension or expulsion.

**Financial Drop Deadline:** Students who drop a class by the Financial Deadline indicated in MySlice may request a refund of any unspent or uncommitted portion of the course fee. There is no refund of course fees to students in the program who make course/credit changes after this deadline except for an excused absence due to a scheduling conflict with other required field study.

## As You Register

Use your copy of your Student Advising Form (with the **yellow-highlighted** Class Numbers found on the [Time Schedule of Classes](#) recorded for each course) and the Registration Instructions that follow. Go online to <http://myslice.syr.edu>. The following will explain things you may note as you register:

- Some courses may reach their enrollment limit and you may find that you are unable to register. You may have the option of adding your name to a Wait List. Wait lists are resolved in Florence; if space opens up during schedule adjustment in Florence, students on wait lists may be able to register for the course. Priority goes to majors, then minors, by class level. Wait-listed students need to demonstrate their continued interest in a course by attending the first class session and speaking with the instructor.

If you are closed out of a course that is fulfilling a specific academic requirement which cannot be met by another course AND which you must take this semester in order to graduate on time, you should document this need by having your home college submit the [Academic Need Verification Form](#). We will make every effort to meet your confirmed academic needs.

- You will not be able to register or make changes to your schedule online after May 23 (an SU Abroad Registration Hold will be placed on your record).

## Help/Questions

**All Florence classes have enrollment limits. You will not be able to register for a class (or section) once the enrollment limit is reached, so be sure to have alternative course selections ready when you register.**

## To ensure the accuracy of your schedule:

- Make sure all the sections start with “Z9\_\_” (this identifies them as Florence classes).
- If you are an undergrad, make sure your Term Credits Total is at least 12 credits to confirm your status as a full-time student and meet Italian immigration requirements. **Do not include credits for wait-listed courses.**
- Be sure to verify the section number of any course that has more than one section to ensure that you’ve registered for the correct section.

## TROUBLESHOOTING AND TIPS

**Cannot see STUDENT SERVICES application:** Within the Orange header of the MySlice there is a CONTENT link. Click this link. The MySlice content page is displayed. In the middle of the page is a pagelet with section names listed with check boxes to their left. Click into the check box next to STUDENT SERVICES. Click the SAVE button at the bottom of the page. The MySlice Homepage is re-displayed and the STUDENT SERVICES section has been added. If the STUDENT SERVICES section is not a selection option, contact the ITS help line at 315-443-2677.

**Availability:** MySlice is scheduled to be available twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week. Regularly scheduled system downtimes will occur for various applications in the portal. Check the ANNOUNCEMENTS on MySlice for advance notification of downtimes. The Information Technology Services (ITS) help line is available during regular University business hours at 315-443-2677.

**Timeout:** There is an inactivity timeout on the web. There will be a warning message displayed after 55 minutes of inactivity: "Your session is about to time out...". After 60 minutes of inactivity, MySlice will "timeout," logging you out of the portal. A dialog box will be displayed with the message: "Your Session has ended". Click the yellow OK button, and log out of your browser. Restart your browser and re-enter the URL <http://myslice.ps.syr.edu> to log into MySlice using your NetID and password.

**Printing Web Pages:** Click inside the open page. Select Print Frame from File menu. When prompted, click OK.

**Scrolling and Moving:** On some web pages, you may have to scroll to the right or left to view all content on page. This is especially important to remember when building a large Time Schedule consisting of multiple-component classes.

**NetID and Password:** You must have an active NetID and password to use MySlice. You only need to activate your NetID one time. To activate your University NetID and password – your keys to the University's computing network – you can follow the simple steps outlined on the University's NetID Web page: <http://selfserv.syr.edu/selfserv/home>

### Terms:

**Autoenroll:** When one part of a course is automatically added to your schedule when you register for the other part. When you drop the Enrolled part, both parts are removed from your schedule.

**Related Part/Component:** One course set up with multiple parts. You need to select each part when registering. You will usually select the first section and then have to select from a prompt list of "related" class sections. An example is a class with two lecture sections and multiple discussion sections listed for each lecture. You must choose one lecture and one section that go together in order to register for the course.

**Section Numbering:** Numbering consists of a letter, representing the campus where the course is offered, and three digits, representing the section. For example, the section Z901 is an SU Abroad Florence course identified by "901." The section M001 is a Main Campus course identified by "001" and U001 is a University College course identified by "001."

## Common Registration Error Messages

Error Message	Explanation	Resolution
Requisite not met for class, not enrolled.	You have not met the requirements (pre-req, class standing, etc.) to enroll in the specified class.	Select another class. If you can demonstrate that you have the background required for the class and should be allowed to register, contact SU Abroad.
Class full; student added to wait list.	Add not processed because class is closed. Class will appear on student's schedule with status = waiting.	Wait list addressed in Florence during schedule adjustment. Wait-listed students do not automatically get added to the class but need to demonstrate their continued interest in a course by attending the first class session.
Enrollment in Courses in Career: Graduates are normally not allowed for those in Career: Undergraduate.	UGRD trying to register for grad level class / GRAD trying to register for undergraduate level class	Contact SU Abroad to find out if you are eligible for this class.
Hold on student's record, add not processed	There is a hold on student's record preventing registration	Refer to Financial Hold letter sent by the Bursar and/or click the VIEW MY HOLDS link in the STUDENT SERVICES section for information about the hold. Must clear holds to be able to register.
Maximum term student unit load exceeded	UGRAD = trying to register for more than 16 credits GRAD = trying to register for more than 15 credits	Contact SU Abroad. In certain cases (because of Audit or with Permission from the Honors Program), an override may be granted.
No valid appointment found and open enrollment period has not begun	You are trying to register before initial access date/time or during a time period when the system is not available for registration.	Try again at appropriate time. Contact SU Abroad if attempting to access during the appropriate time.
Permission number entered is not valid	Student Specific permission = permission expired	Contact SU Abroad for clarification on permission status.
Student already enrolled in class, add not processed	Course already on your schedule	Check class number(s)
Student not enrolled; class and wait list are full.	Both the class and wait list are closed.	Select another class. Use the <a href="#">Academic Need Verification Form</a> only if you meet <b>this</b> specific course <b>this</b> semester in order to graduate on time.
Student not enrolled; class full or restricted	The class is closed OR you do not meet class requirements	Select another class; choose wait list if available. Use the <a href="#">Academic Need Verification Form</a> only if you meet the class requirements AND need <b>this</b> specific course <b>this</b> semester in order to graduate on time.
Student not enrolled, student needs permission to enroll in this class	The class is closed or restricted. You may be able to obtain permission to enroll in the class by contacting SU Abroad.	Select another class or contact SU Abroad for additional information.
