

PREPARE FOR ONLINE REGISTRATION SCHEDULED FOR November 28 - December 1

Step 1 - Request Courses



- Select courses and plan your desired schedule, consulting the Time Schedule of Classes.
 - → You need special permission from Syracuse Abroad to take any course not found on the Time Schedule.
- Follow the online instructions to complete the Student Advising Form (SAF):
 - → Log into your <u>online application</u>. Go to Learning Content:

 Post-decision > Academic Packet.
- Submit your SAF by October 31st.
 - → Be sure to hit 'Submit.' (Don't simply print your SAF!)
 - → Do NOT submit more than one questionnaire.



Step 2 - Seek Advising and Upload Signed SAF to Syracuse Abroad

- Print the PDF of your submitted SAF (emailed to you after submission) and take it to your advisor(s) for signature and to ensure your course plan will keep you on track for graduation.
 - → It is helpful to print and provide your advisor(s) with <u>descriptions</u> of all the courses you want to get approved.
- Upload SAF signed by your advisor(s) to your <u>online application</u> no later than November 10th. Be sure to hit 'Submit' (not 'Save').
 - → Upload to Questionnaire: Student Advising Form (with Advisor's Signature). Only legible PDF files will be accepted.
 - → Syracuse Abroad will record any changes made on your uploaded SAF as a result of consultation with your advisor(s).
 - → You can access your uploaded SAF by returning to the Questionnaire at any time. It can be helpful to refer to your SAF when you register online November 28-December 1.

PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS AND ACADEMIC RESOURCES

- Due to UK immigration requirements, undergraduates may not drop below 12 credits of Syracuse Abroad courses taught in London at any point during the semester. These types of courses do not count toward your required 12-credit minimum enrollment: a Signature Seminar course, online credits, or independent study with a main campus sponsor. The typical course load is 15 credits. You may not register for more than 19 total credits without approval from your home college (visiting students seek approval from Syracuse Abroad); registration over 19 credits is subject to additional per-credit tuition charges.
- At Syracuse University, all work for registered classes must be completed on or before the degree certification date. If you are graduating, you should seek advice from your home college regarding your degree certification date and also be certain you are aware of any remaining degree requirements.
- Information on enrollment policies, grades, SU library resources, internships, independent study and registration can be found on the *Preparing To Go website*. Visiting students should also look at this site for information on transfer credit and requesting an SU transcript.
- You should carefully review <u>academic policies</u> applicable to all Syracuse Abroad programs.
- If you need to take an online course during a semester abroad, first review Syracuse Abroad-specific policy.
- Arrangements to do coursework on an <u>independent research</u> basis if needed to satisfy a degree requirement must be made in advance. Due date for such proposals is November 15.
- You should regularly check your syr.edu email for messages from Syracuse Abroad.

All the courses expected to be offered this semester are listed on the provisional Time Schedule of Classes. Syracuse University reserves the right to cancel a course with low enrollment or to change the course format to an independent study.



INTERNSHIP COURSE

If you indicated on the Internship Request Form or Independent Internship Form that you are pursuing an internship placement, you need to include BUA 400/RAE/MUI 408 - The Global Workplace on your Student Advising Form. You should also get advising as to whether your school or college has any limitations or restrictions on your registering for this course.

- SU Newhouse students in communications internships must register The Global Workplace class for 2 credits and their internship as COM 470 for 1 credit. In addition, they must arrange for a main campus Newhouse faculty sponsor before going abroad and will need to petition for approval once the internship is confirmed. Approval is based on the proposal you submit which is subject to review by the communications department and your college dean.
- SU Whitman students may not use internships abroad to fulfill their internship degree requirement. Students are encouraged to discuss any internship plan with Whitman advising staff.
- SU iSchool students in placements related to information studies must also complete iSchool internship requirements via BlackBoard.

Internship placements require a two-day per week commitment so you need to plan a schedule with *The Global Workplace* and 3-4 other courses that leaves two days open, one of which may have to be a Friday.



LONDON AS YOUR CLASSROOM and COURSE-RELATED FEES

Many of our courses get you out of the classroom and into museums, theatres, and cultural and religious centers where you will view or experience what you are studying. Some of these courses carry fees for site visits that are an integral part of the course. Please carefully review the <u>course-related fee sheet</u> and also share it with your parents/guardians if they are financially responsible for your fees. If you register for any course with a mandatory study tour(s), you must participate in this field study. **Do not plan personal travel until you get to London and know when you may be required to take part in a class-related study tour, make-up classes, exam periods, and other academic commitments.** Fees to cover the costs of these study tours are charged automatically to your Bursar account when you register. If a study tour is described as optional, you will pay the fee with a credit card (Visa or MasterCard) in London.

You should also pay attention to the "Visits" Column of the Time Schedule to ensure that you can fit both the class meeting time and any visit time into your schedule (note that you need to allow 20-minutes travel time to and from a visit, so you cannot schedule another course which meets immediately before or after a visit).

ONLINE REGISTRATION: November 28-December 1

You will receive information in mid-November about registering online for your London courses. During online registration you may register for no more than 5 semester courses (15-16 credits, not counting an optional Signature Seminar course). Students who need to initially register for more than this typical course load should contact <u>lackie Lewis-Frenay</u> in our office prior to the registration period and explain their need. Students who would like (but don't need) to take more than 15 credits may add a course in London during the first week of classes, on a space-available basis.

Instructions, including your individual registration appointment time, will be available about ten days before online registration starts. Be sure to regularly check your email. Some courses are likely to reach capacity and close during registration. Be sure to select some alternative classes on your Student Advising Form, in case a class you would like to take is closed when you register.

REGISTRATION RESTRICTIONS

- Some courses are open only to students admitted to the London Architecture or Design Programs as noted on the Time Schedule.
- In order to register for certain other courses, you will need permission from our office. Carefully review the list of <u>Special Enrollment Courses</u>.
- Plan to register for only one sociology course (sociology majors may register for two):

SOC 200.1 - London Subculture: Collective Identity, Business and Space SOC 367 - Sociology of Sport SOC/QSX/WGS 400.1 - Sex, Gender and the City SOC 412 - Multicultural London

All registration restrictions will be confirmed or announced in the detailed registration instructions emailed to you prior to online registration.

SPECIAL ENROLLMENT COURSES

LONDON SPRING 2018

In order to register for any of these courses, you need special permission from our office. If you wish to be considered for any of these courses, you must:

- → list it among your **Primary Course Selections**, specifying which section when applicable, on your SAF
- → submit your SAF questionnaire by the October 31st deadline and upload the SAF signed by your advisor by the November 10th deadline!
- → make sure you have met all course pre-requisites

Qualified students with permission to register for these courses will receive email notification in mid-November.

ANT 352/HNR 360.1 - FOOD, CULTURE AND IDENTITY - HONORS (I. Bajic-Hajdukovic)

- maximum enrollment is 15
- Prereq: minimum cumulative GPA of 3.4 or in SU Honors Program
- enrollment priority given to Syracuse Honors Program student (this course may be fully enrolled with these students)

COM 346 - RACE, GENDER AND THE MEDIA (J. Springer)

- maximum enrollment is 25
- Prereq: COM 107- Communications & Society or an equivalent introduction to mass media course; strong academic record
- enrollment priority given to Syracuse public communications majors who have not yet met their diversity requirement (this course may be fully enrolled with SU PC majors)
- not open to students in COM 348 during online registration

COM 348 - BEAUTY AND DIVERSITY IN FASHION MEDIA (I. Pickering)

- maximum enrollment is 25
- Prereq: strong academic record
- enrollment priority given to Syracuse public communications majors who have not yet met their diversity requirement (this course may be fully enrolled with SU PC majors)
- not open to students in COM 346 during online registration

COM 505 - COMMUNICATIONS LAW FOR JOURNALISTS (D. Panethiere)

- maximum enrollment is 25
- Prereg: COM 107- Communications & Society or an equivalent introduction to mass media course; strong academic record
- enrollment priority given to Syracuse public communications majors (this course may be fully enrolled with SU PC majors)

PHO 204 - INTRODUCTION TO PHOTOGRAPHY (I. Hessenberg)

- maximum enrollment is 12 per section; two sections offered (be sure to indicate which section(s) fit into your schedule)
- enrollment priority to students with a documented academic need, then by graduation date and date of SAF submission
- sections may be fully enrolled with Design Program students for whom this course fulfills a studio requirement
- a mandatory day-long trip is included in this course, usually on a Friday in the first part of the semester.
- students who successfully register for this class are encouraged to bring to London either a single lens reflex (SLR) film or digital camera, however a good 10 megapixel compact "point and shoot" camera is acceptable. This class also requires the use of Adobe Creative Suite 6 Design Standard (available on eight computers in the London Centre's photo lab). If you are bringing a personal computer, the professor suggests that you may want to purchase this software before departure (it is cheaper than in the U.K. and you may be eligible for a student discount through the SU or your own university's bookstore).

Students who register for any of the courses listed below will be charged a fee to cover lab supplies and maintenance, concert or theatre tickets, and/or special activities, such as study tours, which are an integral part of the course. Study tour fees may reflect the cost of transportation, accommodations, some group meals and entry fees. This is not a bill.

Fees are billed from Syracuse following online registration, appearing on a subsequent Bursar statement. Students receive an email notice to view their bill in MySlice. These fees are not included in either the tuition or program fee charges, which are typically billed prior to course fee billing. Any new course-related fees or fee increases approved after this date will be announced prior to registration. All students who register for a course with a course-related fee are required to pay the fee, even if they are only auditing the course.

Please note that any field study listed below is **mandatory** for registered students and some trips may take place over a weekend. Do NOT make travel plans before you arrive in London and see your course outlines, otherwise you might need to rearrange your personal travel plans since course-related field study take precedence.

Financial Deadline to Withdraw from the Program: Please refer to the <u>SU Tuition</u>, <u>Fees</u>, <u>and Related Policies Bulletin</u> for information on refund of course-related fees for students who withdraw from the program voluntarily, involuntarily, or due to suspension or expulsion.

Financial Drop Deadline: Students who drop a class by the Financial Deadline indicated in MySlice may request a refund of any unspent or uncommitted portion of the course fee. There is no refund of course fees to students who drop a class after this deadline.
