

PREPARE FOR ONLINE REGISTRATION SCHEDULED FOR MAY 22-31

STEP 1: Request Courses

- □ **Review** this packet and <u>course descriptions</u> on the Syracuse Abroad website. You may also look at recent course syllabi in Blackboard (check your email for a message sent on April 6 regarding how to access syllabi).
- □ **Consult** the Time Schedule of Classes to select courses and plan your desired schedule.
 - → You need special permission from Syracuse Abroad to take any course other than those found on the Time Schedule.



- **Follow** the online instructions to complete the Student Advising Form (SAF):
 - → Log into your <u>OrangeAbroad portal</u>. Go to **Learning Content:** *Academic Packet*.
- **Submit** your SAF by **April 20**.
 - \rightarrow Be sure to hit "Submit" (don't simply print SAF!).
 - \rightarrow Do NOT submit more than one questionnaire.

STEP 2: Obtain Advising and Upload Signed SAF to OrangeAbroad

- **Print** the PDF of your submitted SAF (emailed to you after submission), and take it to your advisor(s) to ensure your course plan will keep you on track for graduation.
 - \rightarrow It is helpful to print and provide your advisor with <u>descriptions</u> of all the courses you want to have approved.

Upload SAF signed by your advisor(s) to your online application no later than May 1.

- → Upload to Questionnaires: Student Advising Form (with Advisor's Signature). Be sure to hit "Submit" (not "Save"). Only legible PDF files will be accepted.
- → Syracuse Abroad will record any changes made on your uploaded Student Advising Form as a result of consultation with your advisor(s).
- → You can access your uploaded SAF by returning to the Questionnaire at any time. It can be helpful to refer to your SAF when you register online May 22-31.

ACADEMIC RESOURCES

- At Syracuse University, all work for registered classes must be completed on or before the degree certification date. If you are graduating, you should seek advice from your home college regarding your degree certification date, and also be certain that you are aware of any remaining degree requirements.
- Information on enrollment policies, grades, SU library resources, registration, internships and independent research can be found on the <u>Preparing To Go website</u>. Visiting students should also look at this website for information on transfer credit and <u>requesting an SU transcript</u>.
- You should carefully review <u>academic policies</u> applicable to all Syracuse Abroad programs.
- Figure 1 If you need to take an <u>online course</u> during a semester abroad, first review Syracuse Abroad-specific policy.
- Arrangements to do coursework on an <u>independent research basis</u>, if needed to satisfy a degree requirement, must be made **in advance**. Due date for proposals is **April 15**.
- You should regularly check your *syr.edu* email for messages from Syracuse Abroad.

COURSE INFORMATION

All the courses expected to be offered this semester are listed on the provisional Time Schedule of Classes. Syracuse University reserves the right to cancel a course with low enrollment or to change the course format to an independent study.

- Where there is greater demand than space available in a course, preference for enrollment is given to majors and minors or others who can demonstrate academic need (*i.e.*, the course fulfills a specific requirement that cannot be met by another course) and who have listed the course among their Primary Course Selections on the SAF.
- Be sure you have met all prerequisites for courses you plan to take. Prerequisites are indicated in <u>course</u> <u>descriptions</u>, with equivalent courses described for visiting students. If you do not meet the prerequisite, you should not include the course on your SAF.

Program Requirements

All undergraduate students are required to take the following:

- A minimum of 12 credits (not counting Signature Seminar credits). Due to Italian immigration requirements, you may not drop below 12 credits (not counting Signature Seminar credits) at any point during the semester. The typical course load is 15 credits. You may not register for more than 19 total credits without approval from your home college (visiting students seek approval from Syracuse Abroad); registration over 19 credits is subject to additional per-credit tuition charges.
- An Italian language or literature course(s). See <u>Italian Language section</u> for details.
- Any courses required by your specific Syracuse Florence Special Program. See <u>Special Programs</u> for further details.

Italian Language Placement Exam

Your language level will be confirmed with an assessment in Florence but **matriculated Syracuse University students** may first need to take an online placement exam:

- Syracuse students: Unless one of the below applies, you *must* take the online Italian placement exam (accessed through MySlice) before submitting your SAF:
 - \Box I have already taken one or more ITA classes <u>at SU</u>.
 - □ I have already taken SU's Italian online placement exam.

All other SU students, **including** native and heritage speakers of Italian and students with ITA AP, IB, other college-level or transfer credit, should take the placement exam before submitting their SAF. This will identify your language level, allowing you to register for the appropriate course in Florence. Instructions on accessing this exam are available <u>online</u>.

Visiting Students: If you are unsure of your language level, review the Italian <u>course</u> <u>descriptions</u> and consult with an advisor in the languages department of your home school. You may also request access to SU's online placement exam by contacting <u>Jackie Lewis-Frenay</u>.

Now that you know your language level, refer to the section below that represents the program to which you've been admitted to learn more about Italian language requirements and options:

Students admitted to the Florence Center *or* **Center & University of Florence** (Courses Taught in English) **Programs:**

Beginning (100) or intermediate (200) levels. If you are at one of these levels, you will take six credits: a 4-credit core course plus a 2-credit co-requisite course that connects you with the local community and culture through activities both in and outside of the classroom.

When planning your schedule and selecting non-ITA courses, **leave one time slot free** from Monday through Thursday for your Italian language class. Your ITA class will meet at the same time every day, Monday–Thursday. See the Time Schedule for details of time slots at each level.

- Advanced levels. If you have already completed four semesters of college-level Italian, you are eligible to take one or both of the following 3-credit courses:
 - ITA 325 <u>Advanced Language Usage</u>
 - ITA 421 <u>Patterns of Modernity in 20th Century Italian Literature</u>

Students admitted to the Intensive Italian Language Program:

You will take Italian language instruction at the *Centro di Cultura per Stranieri* (see <u>Special Programs section</u>, below).

Students admitted to the Architecture and Studio Arts Programs:

You may take any option listed above for Florence Center Program students. You also have these additional options:

• If you are at the beginning or intermediate language levels, you are allowed to take language for the *first half of the semester only*, earning 3 credits (see ITA 115A, 116A, 215A, 216A on the Time Schedule of Classes).

Note: You may opt to continue your ITA study for the second half of the semester changing your registration to 6 credits before mid-term.

Beginning students only may consider a *semester-long* 3-credit Beginning Italian I course (see ITA 115B on the Time Schedule).

PLEASE NOTE: If you select either of these 3-credit options, you should **not** expect to continue Italian language study at SU without repeating some previous coursework.

STUDY TOURS AND COURSE FEES

Many courses get you out of the classroom and into museums and cultural centers where you will view or experience what you are studying. Some of these courses carry fees for study tours, site visits, activities, or supplies that are an integral part of the course. Course fees for Fall 2018 are not yet available, but you will see the most recent fees noted within the applicable online <u>course descriptions</u>. A list of confirmed course fees will be available in early May as part of your Registration Packet.

If you register for any course with a mandatory study tour, you must participate in this field study. **Do not plan personal travel until you get to Florence and know when you may be required to take part in any class-related study tours, all-program trips, Signature Seminar sessions, make-up classes, exam periods, andother academic commitments.**

ONLINE REGISTRATION: MAY 22-31

You will receive information in early May about registering online for your Florence courses. During online registration, you may register for no more than **15-16 credits** (not counting an optional Signature Seminar course). If you need to initially register for more than this typical course load, contact <u>Jackie Lewis-Frenay</u> in our office prior to the registration period to explain your need. If you would like (but don't need) to take more than 16 credits, you may add a course in Florence on a space-available basis during the first week of classes.

Instructions, including your individual registration appointment time, will be available in early May before online registration starts. Be sure to regularly check your email for this information. Remember that some courses are likely to reach capacity and close during registration. Be sure to select some alternative classes on your <u>Student</u> <u>Advising Form</u>, in case a class you would like to take is closed when you register.

Registration Restrictions

- Some courses are open only to students admitted to Florence Special Programs as noted on the Time Schedule. See <u>Special Programs at Syracuse Florence</u> for more information.
- In order to register for certain other courses, you will need permission from our office. Carefully review the information on <u>Special Enrollment Courses</u>.

Plan to register for only one sociology course (sociology majors may register for two): SOC/HST 300.1 – <u>The Italian Mafia</u> SOC/HST/WGS 454 – <u>Family and Gender in Contemporary Italy</u>

Plan to register for only **one** of these art history courses:

HOA 203 - Italian Arts from Antiquity to Michelangelo

HOA 320 - Italian Renaissance Art

Students may not register for both of the following art history courses, since similar content is covered in each:

HOA 320 - Italian Renaissance Art

HOA 424 - Sixteenth Century Italian Art and Identity

All registration restrictions will be confirmed or announced in the Registration Packet available prior to online registration.

SPECIAL ENROLLMENT COURSES

In order to register for a Special Enrollment course, you will need special permission from Syracuse Abroad. If you wish to be considered for enrollment, *you must meet the following three requirements*:

- \rightarrow List the course among your **Primary Course Selections** on your SAF,
- \rightarrow Submit your SAF questionnaire by the April 20 deadline; and
- \rightarrow Upload the signed SAF to OrangeAbroad by the May 1 deadline.

If you receive permission to register for either course, you will receive email notification in early May.

EAR 100.1 – Introduction to Geology

- Priority to freshmen
- Maximum enrollment for upperclassmen is 10
- SU students may not earn credit for this course and EAR 100, 105, or 110

PSC 380.3 - Politics of Economic Globalization

This University of Florence course affords Syracuse Florence (SUF) students an exciting opportunity to take a class with Italian undergraduates even if you're not proficient in Italian. The class is taught in English on the SUF campus and follows the SUF calendar.

- Maximum enrollment is 15
- Priority to political science majors
- Students must attend a mandatory meeting during orientation (more information available in the Orientation Booklet you receive when you arrive in Florence)

SPECIAL PROGRAMS AT SYRACUSE FLORENCE

Architecture Program

Courses required of Architecture majors (ARC 408 and ARC 571) are open only to students admitted to the architecture special programs (<u>B.Arch</u>). You will work with your advisor to select an approved Professional Elective and round out your schedule by selecting from other Florence center courses.

Studio Arts Program

If you plan on taking more than one Studio Arts course, you must apply and be accepted to the <u>Studio Arts special</u> program. Only Studio Arts program students register online for Studio Arts courses.

Studio Arts program students select from studio courses at Florentine studios and SUF, and from liberal arts courses offered at the Florence center.

If you have not been admitted to the Studio Arts (SA) Program, you may register **in Florence** for **one studio arts course only** with the consent of the Supervisor for Academics and the instructor. While enrollment priority is given to students enrolled in the SA program, **Studio Arts welcomes all students**, including beginners, to its classes. All students are invited to explore a studio arts class by attending the Studio Arts meeting during Orientation in Florence.

Non-SA Program students requesting an intermediate or advanced level course should be prepared to demonstrate their ability through samples of their work or evidence of prior coursework. Samples of work will be reviewed during academic advising in Florence.

Florence Center & University of Florence (courses taught in English) Program

Courses offered in English by the University of Florence (UniFI) provide an exciting opportunity for students who are not proficient in Italian language to take a class with Italian undergraduates. These classes meet at UniFI, an approximately 30-minute commute from the SUF campus. If you applied and were accepted to this program you are expected to enroll in at least one of the following courses. **If you do not intend to take any of these courses**, contact our interim Florence Admissions Counselor, <u>Lucile Matthews</u> and ask to be switched to the Florence Center Program.

ECN 480.1 – <u>Economics of Innovation</u> (3–4 credits)

ECN/IRP 480.2 - Human Development and International Cooperation (3 credits)

ECN 480.4 – International Economics II (3 credits)

IRP/PSC 380.1 - International Conflict Transformation (3 credits)

MAT 580.1 - Statistical Inference (3-4 credits)

PSC 380.4 – Human Rights and Armed Conflicts (3 credits)

Be sure you have met any prerequisites in the <u>course descriptions</u>. **These courses are open only to students accepted to this program**. Students taking UniFI classes must attend a mandatory meeting during orientation (more information available in the Orientation Booklet you receive when you arrive in Florence).

Intensive Language Program at the University of Florence

If you have been admitted to the Intensive Language program at the University of Florence, you should select on your SAF and seek advisor approval for these required courses:

- ITA 315 <u>Italian Practicum I</u> (1 credit)
- An Intensive Italian language course (6 credits; a brief assessment in Florence will determine which section you will take):
 - ITA 380.1 <u>Intermediate High</u>
 - ITA 380.2 <u>Advanced I</u>
 - ITA 380.3 Advanced II

These courses are open only to students accepted to this program. Students in this Intensive Language Program must attend a mandatory meeting during orientation (more information available in the Orientation Booklet you receive when you arrive in Florence).

You should also seek approval for at least two or three other courses offered at the Florence Center (refer to the Time Schedule and **select only afternoon courses**, since your Italian language course at the *Centro di Cultura per Stranieri* meets every morning Monday through Friday). **Syracuse Abroad recommends this center course** taught in Italian and offered during the afternoon:

ITALIAN LANGUAGE

If you are a visiting student with prior background in the language, you may need to consult with the Italian Dept. at your home college in order to select the appropriate level. Matriculated Syracuse University students who haven't taken an ITA course <u>at SU</u> will need to take the online Placement Survey in order to register for the appropriate language level.

Students in the Architecture or Studio Arts programs may opt to take Italian for only the first half of the semester, earning 3 credits. Please see Option A on next page. Beginning Italian students in Architecture or Studio Arts programs may opt to take this 3-credit course meeting twice a week for the entire semester. Please see Option B, next page.
