1. <u>Trigger Warning</u> [The "trigger warning" clause is optional and each instructor will decide whether or not to include it].

Because of the nature of the topics covered in this class, the course readings or class discussions may generate intellectual and emotional discomfort. These responses are natural parts of intellectual growth. If, however, your emotional response becomes acute psychological distress (triggering), please communicate with me. I invite you to contact me if you have concerns in this regard.

2. Attendance and Punctuality

- Attendance and punctuality are mandatory for all courses at Syracuse Madrid.
- Course-related field trips are mandatory to attend, and some may take place during non-class hours or on weekends, as indicated in the syllabus.

c) Excused Absences:

- An absence can only be excused for documented medical reasons or emergencies when approved by SU Madrid Assistant, Student Life Wellness, Raquel Perea. Any absence from class must be accompanied by a medical note issued by a Madrid-based health care provider for it to be excused (within 48 hours for classes and 24 hours for exams). Failure to provide a valid doctor's note within this time frame will result in the absence being unexcused. It is the student's responsibility to justify their absence with the Student Life Wellness Assistant Raquel Perea at rparenas@syr.edu and obtain any missed course material from the instructor in a timely manner. Please note that repeated absences, even with a doctor's note, may require a meeting with the Assistant Directors from the Student Life and Academics Office.
- Non-health-related absences are exceptional, for very specific and documented reasons, and need to be dealt with by the Academic office preferably in advance.

d) Unexcused Absences:

- Failure to participate in a mandatory course-related field trip counts as an unexcused class absence. Do not make personal travel plans before you arrive in Madrid and review your course outlines to understand your academic commitments. Otherwise, because course-related field trips take precedence, you will need to rearrange your personal travel plans at your own expense.
- Personal travel inside or outside of Madrid during class sessions is an unexcused absence. This includes family visits.
- Students must inform the professor prior to the start of class if they know they will be tardy for a valid reason; tardy students should enter the room discreetly and quietly. Excessive tardiness may be counted as an unexcused absence and may affect the final grade the student earns, at the professor's discretion.
- Students are expected to stay for the duration of the class and to leave only during designated breaks except in the case of a valid and documented medical necessity.
 Frequent missed time in class maybe counted as an unexcused absence, at the professor's discretion.
- A student that falls asleep during the class may be asked by the professor to leave the classroom and may be counted as an unexcused absence for that class, at the professor's discretion.

- Students who are having side conversations that distract
 the instructor, or your fellow students maybe asked by
 the professor to leave the classroom and may be counted
 as an unexcused absence for that class, at the professor's
 discretion.
- If you are unable to attend class for unforeseen reasons, the first TWO unexcused absences will not count against you, after which, every additional unexcused absence will decrease your final grade (e.g. an A will become A-; A- will become B+; a B+ becomes a B, a B becomes a B-, etc..). This is not applicable to scheduled field trips. Unexcused absences from overnight field trips may be counted as double, at the professor's discretion.
- e) Faculty will use Early-Semester Progress Reports (ESPR) and Mid-Semester Progress Reports (MSPR) in Orange SUccess to alert the Registrar and Financial Aid Office on non-attendance. More information regarding Orange SUccess can be found here.

3. Faith Tradition Observances

Syracuse University's Religious Observances Policy recognizes the diversity of faiths represented in the campus community and protects the rights of students, faculty, and staff to observe religious holy days according to their traditions. Under the policy, students are given an opportunity to make up any examination, study, or work requirements that may be missed due to a religious observance, provided they notify their instructors no later than the academic drop deadline. For observances occurring before the drop deadline, notification is required at least two academic days in advance. Students may enter their observances in MySlice under Student Services/Enrollment/My Religious Observances/Add a Notification

4. Quizzes, Assessment and Exams

- Any missed assessment (including, but not limited to quizzes, exams, presentations, site visits or field trips) due to an unexcused absence cannot be made up (see Faith Tradition Observances for exception). Any absence from an above-listed assessment must be accompanied by a medical note issued by a Madrid-based health care provider for it to be excused (within 24 hours for exams). Failure to provide a valid doctor's note within this time frame will result in the absence being unexcused. It is the student's responsibility to justify their absence with the Student Life Wellness Assistant Raquel Perea at rparenas@syr.edu and obtain any missed course material from the instructor in a timely manner. Please note that repeated absences, even with a doctor's note, may require a meeting with the Assistant Directors from the Student Life and Academic Office.
- Academic work is due on dates indicated in the syllabus or by the professor. **Missed classwork due to an unexcused absence cannot be made up.** Making up classwork missed due to an excused absence should be arranged with the professor on a case-by-case basis, at the professor's discretion. Late assignments will be penalized for every calendar day after the deadline.
- Students that arrive up to 15 minutes late from their scheduled start time for a quiz or exam will be permitted to take it; however, they will be advised that their end time will remain the same. If they arrive more than 15 minutes after their scheduled start time, they will not be allowed to take the quiz or exam.
- The instructors may require students to hand over their cell phones/smartwatches or any electronic devices before being seated for a quiz or exam.

 Requests for examination day/time changes are possible in extraordinary circumstances—Exceptional reasons do not include faculty or student preferences (even if there is concurrence for an earlier exam), nor as an accommodation for faculty or student travel

5. Learning Environment

All members of the class are expected to respect the learning environment and the professor's efforts to maintain it. Students may not attend, submit work, audit, or otherwise participate in courses without being officially enrolled. Instructors may not allow students to attend classes or submit work unless they appear on the official class list or are attending with instructor approval for the purpose of making up an Incomplete (I) grade in a prior term. Check your class roster regularly to ensure that everyone attending is registered for the class.

This class will use the Blackboard Learning Management to house the syllabus, course content, links to external course materials, assignments, quizzes, exams, feedback, and grades. Due dates and times in Blackboard are stored in Coordinated Universal Time (UTC) and displayed for each user based on the time zone setting of their computer and data from their internet browser. The system will always display the time zone being used. If an instructor sets a due date of 11pm Eastern time, a student in the Pacific time zone will see a due date of 8pm."

10. Intellectual Property

Original class materials (handouts, assignments, tests, etc.), recordings of class sessions, materials posted on Blackboard are the intellectual property of the course instructor. Materials may be downloaded for class use, but may not be provided to other parties (e.g., web sites, social media, anyone who is not enrolled in this class) without the written consent of the instructor. Classes may not be recorded in any way without the written consent of the instructor. Doing so is a violation of intellectual property law and of the student code of conduct.

11. Student Academic Work

Academic work completed during semester may be used by professors for educational purposes in courses during the semester. Students' registration and continued enrollment constitute consent for this purpose. Before using students' work for educational purposes in current and/or subsequent semesters, professors will either request students' permission in writing or render the work anonymous by removing all personal identification.
