

Prepare for Online Registration (Nov. 28-Dec. 1)

STEP	1: Request Courses
	Review this packet and <u>course descriptions</u> on the Syracuse Abroad website.
	Select courses and plan your desired schedule, consulting the <u>Time Schedule of Classes</u> .
	→ You need special permission from Syracuse Abroad to take any course other than those found on the Time Schedule. (Exceptions are made for pre-approved <u>Universidad Autónoma de Madrid Liberal Arts courses</u> for students accepted to that program.)
	Follow the online instructions to complete the Student Advising Form (SAF):
	→ Log into your <u>online application</u> . Go to Learning Content: Post-decision > Academic Packet.
	Submit your SAF by October 31. Be sure to hit "Submit." (Don't simply print your SAF!)
	→ Do NOT submit more than one questionnaire.
STEP	2: Obtain Advising and Upload Signed SAF to Syracuse Abroad
	Print the PDF of your submitted SAF (emailed to you after submission), and take it to your advisor(s) for signature(s) and to ensure your course plan will keep you on track for graduation.
	→ It is helpful to print and provide your advisor with <u>descriptions</u> of all the courses you want to have approved.
	Upload SAF signed by your advisor(s) to your online application by November 10 .
	→ Upload to Questionnaires: Student Advising Form (with Advisor's Signature). Be sure to hit "Submit" (not "Save"). Only legible PDF files will be accepted.
	→ Syracuse Abroad will record any changes made on your uploaded Student Advising Form as a result of your meeting with your advisor(s). Please indicate whether you have made any changes to your original selections.
	You may return to your online application to access your uploaded form. It can be helpful to refer to your SAF when you register online November 28-December 1.

Grades and Academic Resources

- At Syracuse University, all work for registered classes must be completed on or before the degree certification date. If you are graduating, you should seek advice from your home college regarding your degree certification date, and also be certain that you are aware of any remaining degree requirements.
- Information on enrollment policies, grades, SU library resources, registration, internships and independent research can be found on the Preparing To Go website. Visiting students should also look at this website for information on transfer credit and reguesting an SU transcript.
- You should carefully review <u>academic policies</u> applicable to all Syracuse Abroad programs.

- If you need to take an online course during a semester abroad, first review Syracuse Abroad-specific policy.
- Arrangements to do coursework on an <u>independent research basis</u>, if needed to satisfy a degree requirement, must be made **in advance**. Due date for proposals is **November 15**.
- You should regularly check your **__@syr.edu** email address for messages from Syracuse Abroad.

Course Information

All the courses expected to be offered this semester are listed on the provisional <u>Time Schedule of Classes</u> and <u>Timetable schematic</u>. Syracuse University reserves the right to cancel a course with low enrollment or to change the course format to an independent study.

- Where there is greater demand than space available in a course, preference for enrollment is given to majors and minors or others who can demonstrate academic need (i.e., the course fulfills a specific requirement that cannot be met by another course) and who have listed the course among their Primary Course Selections on the SAF.
- Be sure you have met all prerequisites for courses you plan to take. Prerequisites are indicated in <u>course descriptions</u>, with equivalent courses described for visiting students. If you do not meet the prerequisite, you should not include the course on your SAF.



Program Requirements

All students are required to take the following:

- A Signature Seminar (Azahar, Imperium, Spanish Identities, or Marine Ecology of the Mediterranean Sea and North Africa; 3 credits). You may not drop the Signature Seminar.
- A minimum of 12 credits (not counting Signature Seminar credits). Due to the Spanish immigration requirements that undergraduate students enroll on a full-time basis, you may not drop below 12 credits (excluding any Signature Seminar credits) at any point during the semester.

At least one course taught in Spanish. Students at an advanced level must take TWO courses. You can find out your specific requirement(s) by identifying your language level and consulting the chart below. Please also refer to the course descriptions on our website.

Spanish Language Placement Exam

SYRACUSE STUDENTS: Unless one of the below applies, you must take the online Spanish language placement exam (accessed through MySlice) BEFORE submitting your SAF!

- You have already taken one or more SPA classes at Syracuse, or
- You have already taken SU's Spanish online placement exam.

All other SU students—including native and heritage speakers of Spanish, as well as students with AP, IB, or other college-level or transfer Spanish credit—must take the placement exam. This will identify your language level and allow you to register for the appropriate course. <u>Instructions on accessing this exam</u> are available online.

Beginning SU students: Even if you have no experience studying the language, you must complete the exam in order to receive your SPA 101 placement. If you don't take the exam, MySlice will not allow you to register online.

Visiting students: If you are unsure of your language level, review the Spanish language <u>course descriptions</u> and consult with an advisor in the languages department of your home school. You may also request access to SU's online placement exam by <u>emailing Jeanne Chu</u>.

Study Tours and Course Fees

Some courses include required study tours, site visits, or activities that are an integral part of the course. Please carefully review the <u>Course-Related Fee Sheet</u>, and also share it with your parents/guardians if they are financially responsible for your fees. Fees to cover the costs of supplies and mandatory field study are charged automatically to your Bursar account when you register.

If you register for any course with a mandatory study tour, you must participate in this field study. **DO NOT PLAN**PERSONAL TRAVEL until you get to Madrid and know when you may be required to take part in a class-related study tour, make-up classes, Signature Seminar sessions, exam periods, and other academic commitments.

Online Registration

In **mid-November**, before online registration starts, you will receive information about registering for your Madrid Center courses. Be sure to regularly check your email for this information. The Registration Packet will include instructions, FAQs, and your individual registration appointment time.

During online registration, you may register for no more than 5 semester courses (15-16 credits), not counting Signature Seminar credits. Students participating in a Special Program must register online for their Syracuse Madrid Center courses through SU's MySlice system.

Remember that some courses are likely to reach capacity and close during registration. Be sure to select some alternative classes on your <u>Student Advising Form</u>, in case a class you would like to take is closed when you register.

→ Any registration restrictions will be announced in the Registration Packet available prior to online registration.



Special Program: Madrid Center & Liberal Arts at UAM

In November, students participating in this program will receive information via e-mail directly from Universidad Autónoma de Madrid regarding online pre-enrollment for UAM courses. Before you depart, your Admissions Counselor <u>Callie Rogemoser</u> will work directly with you on meeting specific requirements. Upon arrival in Madrid, you will have the opportunity to complete your enrollment with the help of Syracuse Madrid faculty and staff.

UAM follows a different academic calendar from Syracuse Abroad, requiring you to stay beyond the regular Syracuse Madrid Center program end date. The end date for this program is **June 2**.

Grades for courses taken at Universidad Autónoma de Madrid (UAM) may not post to your SU transcript until **August**. At Syracuse University, all work for registered classes must be completed on or before the degree certification date. Again, if you are graduating, seek advice from your home college regarding your degree certification date.

In addition to one or two courses at the UAM, you will take two or more courses at the Madrid Center. Submit, have signed, and upload the SAF seeking approval for Center courses of interest. Center courses that we recommend include the upper-level Spanish language courses ($\underline{\text{SPA 302}}$ and $\underline{\text{SPA 400.1}}$) and the following content courses taught exclusively in Spanish:

- SPA 325/HST/LAS 322 Colonial Latin America
- SPA 364/HOA464 Modern Spanish Art
- SPA/WGS/HST 417 The History of Women in Spain
- SPA 400.2 De Madrid al Cielo: The Culture of Modernity and the Urban Experience in Spain's Capital
- SPA 400.3 Spanish Comedy, Film and Society

You will register online for your Center courses through SU's MySlice system between Nov. 28 and Dec. 1.

The commute by train from the Syracuse Madrid Center to the UAM takes about 30 minutes (the train stop is located on the UAM campus). This means that you cannot take a Madrid Center course that meets immediately before or after a UAM course.

Planning a schedule that includes one or more UAM courses, the required Spanish language course, and other Center courses may be challenging or not possible. This will depend on your language level, what Center courses you need or want, and the final UAM class schedule. Our Madrid Center will work with students once abroad to plan a schedule that balances these considerations.

Course-related Fees Madrid Spring 2018

Review and give to your parent/guardian.

Students who register for any of the courses listed below will be charged a fee to cover special activities, such as study tours or site visits, which are an integral part of each course. Study tour fees may reflect the cost of transportation, accommodations, some group meals, and most site entry fees. **This is not a bill.**

Fees are billed from Syracuse University following the online registration period and will appear on a subsequent Bursar statement. Students receive an email notice to view their bill in MySlice. **These fees are not included** in either the tuition or program fee charges, which are typically billed prior to course fee billing. Any fee increases or new course-related fees approved after this date will be announced prior to registration. All students who register for a course with a course-related fee are required to pay the fee, even if they are only auditing the course.

Financial Deadline to Withdraw from the Program: Please refer to the <u>SU Tuition, Fees, and Related Policies</u> <u>Bulletin</u> for information on refund of course-related fees for students who withdraw from the program voluntarily, involuntarily, or due to suspension or expulsion.

Financial Drop Deadline: Students who drop a class by the Financial Deadline indicated in MySlice may request a refund of any unspent or uncommitted portion of the course fees. There is no refund of course fees to students who drop a course after this deadline.
