## Program Modifications

### New Time Frame

Our program has been modified in response to the changing global situation. The semester is taking place in a more compressed time frame, eliminating U.S.-based participants' need for student visas.

Classes will begin in a distance learning format on **Monday, September 14**, giving you a chance to engage with your professors, fellow students, and course content before you travel.

You will arrive in Madrid on **Thursday, September 24** for mandatory orientation. In-person classes will commence the following Monday, September 28.

### Recommended Number of Credits

**You must register for at least 12 credits IN ADDITION TO** any optional Signature Seminar.

Due to the compressed time frame of this semester, Syracuse Abroad strongly recommends registering for **no more than 15-17 credits**. Any student request to take 18 or more credits is subject to individual approval by Syracuse Abroad's Director of Curriculum & Academic Services, [Dr. Petra Hejnova](#).

## Prepare for Online Registration (scheduled for June 18-25)

### STEP 1: Plan your schedule.

- Consult the [Schedule of Classes](#). Use the [Timetable](#) schematic to avoid time conflicts.
  - You need special permission from Syracuse Abroad to take any course other than those found on the Schedule of Classes.
- Review this document and [course descriptions](#) on the Syracuse Abroad website.

### STEP 2: Submit your course pre-selections on the Student Advising Form (SAF).

- Log into your [OrangeAbroad](#) account. Go to **Learning Content > Planning Your Schedule**
  - Follow the online instructions to complete the Student Advising Form (SAF).
- Submit your SAF by **May 15**.
  - Be sure to hit "**Submit**." (Don't simply print your SAF.)
  - **Do NOT submit more than one questionnaire.**

### STEP 3: Consult your academic advisor(s), and upload the approved SAF to OrangeAbroad.

We understand that you will not be able to meet with your advisor in person! Advising will have to occur over the phone, via email, or video conferencing. Please save and email the SAF back and forth to get the signatures of your advisor(s) as usual.

If not, after discussing with your advisor(s) how each requested course will count in your degree, **please record this information on the 'Counts Toward' lines**. Please also upload a PDF of any email conversation you may have had with an advisor when you upload their SAF.

- Save the PDF of your submitted SAF (emailed to you after submission), and submit it to your advisor(s) to confirm your course plan will keep you on track for graduation.
  - It is helpful to provide your advisors with [descriptions](#) or syllabi for the courses you want to have approved. You may request course syllabi from Madrid admissions counselor [Rick Cieri](#).
- Upload the SAF with the approvals of your advisor(s) to OrangeAbroad no later than **May 26**.
  - Upload to **Questionnaires > Student Advising Form (with Advisor's Signature)**. Be sure to hit "Submit" (NOT "Save"!); **Only legible PDF files will be accepted**. DO NOT SUBMIT A PHOTO OF YOUR SAF.
  - Syracuse Abroad will record any changes made on your uploaded SAF as a result of your meeting with your advisor(s). Please use the dropdown menu to indicate whether you have made any changes to your original selections.

### STEP 4: REGISTER ONLINE for your classes **June 18-25**.

- Please note that registration appointment start times vary.
- It can be helpful to refer to your SAF when you register. You may return to OrangeAbroad to access your uploaded form at any time.

## Grades, Transcripts, and Academic Resources

- **IMPORTANT:** You must remain in good academic standing to participate in our program. If you are placed on academic probation prior to departure, you will be withdrawn from the program. You should carefully review other [academic policies](#) applicable to all Syracuse Abroad programs.
- At Syracuse University, all work for registered classes must be completed on or before the degree certification date. If you are graduating, check with your home college regarding your degree certification date, and be certain that you are aware of any remaining degree requirements.
- Information on enrollment policies, grades, SU library resources, registration, internships and independent research can be found on the [Preparing to Go website](#). **Visiting students** should also refer to this website for information on transfer credit and [requesting an SU transcript](#).

## Madrid Center Course Information

All Madrid Center courses expected to be offered this semester are listed on the provisional [Schedule of Classes](#) and [Timetable](#). Syracuse University reserves the right to cancel a course with low enrollment or to change the course format to an independent study.

- Where there is greater demand than space available in a course, preference for enrollment is given to majors and minors or others who can demonstrate academic need (*i.e.*, the course fulfills a specific requirement that cannot be met by another course) and who have listed the course among their Primary Course Selections on the SAF.
- Be sure you have met all prerequisites for courses you plan to take. Prerequisites are indicated in [course descriptions](#), with equivalent courses described for visiting students. If you do not meet the prerequisite, do not include the course on your SAF.

### Signature Seminars

Signature Seminars are an exciting opportunity to expand your learning beyond the classroom and outside city borders. For this semester, Signature Seminars will be *optional* and held during the November break, October 31-November 9. Each optional seminar will

- Carry 3 credits,
- Require a course-related fee,
- *Require a minimum number of students to run, and*
- *Be subject to any official travel restrictions issued by local and/or national authorities.*

You may choose one of the following:

- **BIO 312 - [Marine Ecology of the Mediterranean Sea and North Africa](#).** This popular seminar allows you to examine up close the main coastal and marine ecosystems of the Mediterranean environment and compares the management practices between Europe and the North of Africa. You'll study how the interactions of human civilizations have shaped the natural environment with both misuses and protective measures. While current restrictions will not allow travel to Morocco, this seminar will explore the coastal ecosystems of Valencia, Murcia, and Almería. *Priority enrollment in this Signature Seminar will go to biology majors, related science majors, and others with a demonstrated academic need (i.e., this course will fulfill a specified degree requirement).*
- **HST/HUM 400.2 - [Imperium: Historical and Artistic Clues to the Origins of the Iberian Empires](#).** This seminar traces the origins of the first colonial European superpower, the political and artistic influences of which were felt around the world well into the 17<sup>th</sup> century. You'll explore firsthand the foundations of this onetime global dominance in culturally rich cities such as Valencia, Granada, Sevilla, and Lisbon (subject to change per travel restrictions). Previous study of Spanish is not required, but students with more proficiency may participate in lectures and visits led in Spanish.

**PLEASE NOTE:** Students opting to take a Signature Seminar must register for 12 credits **IN ADDITION TO** the seminar.

## Program Requirements

All Madrid students are required to take the following:

- **A minimum of 12 credits** in addition to optional Signature Seminar credits. Due to the Spanish immigration requirements that undergraduate students enroll on a full-time basis, you may not drop below 12 credits (excluding any Signature Seminar credits) at any point during the semester.
- **One Spanish language instruction course. Students at an advanced level (300+) must take an ADDITIONAL course taught in Spanish.** You can find out your specific requirement(s) by identifying your language level and consulting the following chart. Please also refer to the [course descriptions](#) on our website.

## Spanish Language Placement Exam

**Visiting students:** If you are unsure of your language level, request Spanish course syllabi from Madrid Admissions Counselor [Rick Cieri](#) and consult with an advisor in the languages department of your home school.

**MATRICULATED SYRACUSE STUDENTS:** You **MUST** take the online Spanish language placement survey/exam (accessed through [MySlice](#)) **BEFORE** submitting your SAF **UNLESS** one of the below applies:

- You have already taken one or more SPA classes **at Syracuse, OR**
- You have previously taken SU's Spanish online placement exam.

**All other SU students**—including beginners, native and heritage speakers of Spanish, AND students with AP, IB, or other college-level or transfer Spanish credit—**must** take the placement survey/exam. This will identify your language level and allow you to register in MySlice for the appropriate course. [Instructions on accessing this exam](#) are available online.

**SU Spanish beginners:** YES! Even if you have no experience studying the language, you must complete the exam in order to receive your SPA 101 placement. *If you don't take the exam, MySlice will prevent you from registering online for your Spanish class.*

**ALL STUDENTS, please note!** The exam was written for first-year university students. When you are asked how many years you have studied Spanish in high school, respond with your **TOTAL NUMBER of years** of Spanish study, **whether in high school or college.**

## Study Tours and Course Fees

Some courses include required study tours, site visits, or activities that are an integral part of the course. You will receive a separate course fee sheet to share with your parents/guardians if they are responsible for your fees. Fees to cover the costs of supplies and mandatory field study are charged automatically to your Bursar account when you register.

If you register for any course with a mandatory study tour, you must participate in this field study. **DO NOT PLAN PERSONAL TRAVEL until you get to Madrid and know when you may be required to take part in a class-related study tour, make-up classes, Signature Seminar sessions, exam periods, and other academic commitments.**

## Online Registration Dates and Details: June 18-25

You will register online **June 18-25**. In **early June**, you will receive information about registering for your Madrid Center courses. Be sure to regularly check your email for this information. The Registration Instructions will include FAQs, and your individual registration appointment time.

Remember that courses can reach capacity and close during registration just as they do on Main Campus. Be sure to select some alternative classes on your Student Advising Form, in case a class you would like to take is closed when you register.
